How to use this book

The Extended Phonic Code series introduces the various spellings for each sound. It can be used with any phonic programme a school is teaching.

The phonic progression in the series can be found on the back of this book.

Encourage the reader to say the sounds in the words and blend the sounds together, using pure sounds, without adding an extra 'uh' sound after the consonant sounds.

High-frequency words are words the reader may not be able to decode at this stage. In the process of learning the Extended Phonic Code, the reader will gradually be able to decode these words. Encourage the reader to sound out the sounds they know and provide the sounds not yet learned (pointing at letters that represent that sound). If the reader is struggling, offer the whole word.

Check that the reader understands all words in the vocabulary on the page opposite.

Before reading this book, the reader needs to know:

- · two or more letters can represent one sound
- the spellings <air> <are> <ere> <ear> <eir> can represent the sound 'air'

This book introduces:

- · the spellings (air) (are) (ere) (ear) for the sound 'air'
- · text at 2 syllable level

High-frequency words:

new, want, ice-creams, take, they, bedtime, was

Vocabulary:

pair - two things that go together

glared - stared in an angry way

declared - said clearly and openly

grinned - smiled showing their teeth

Talk about the story

When Sam gets a new pair of jeans, his little brother, Josh, wants a pair too. "It's not fair!" he says.

Will life ever be fair for little Josh?

Reading Practice

Practise blending these sounds into words:

air are ere ear air bare there bear fair where care pear hair rare tear pair share wear chair glare swear flair eir stare stairs their scare

Next, Mum got ice-creams. "Take care," she said. PLOP! Josh stared at his ice-cream. "It's not fair!"




When they got back, Josh said

Questions for discussion:

- Do you think that Josh's life is not fair? Why?

Game with <air>, <are>, <ere>, <ear>, <eir> words

Play as pelmanism or use for reading practice. Enlarge and photocopy the page twice on two different colours of card. Cut the cards up to play.

Ensure the players sound out the words.
