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How to use this book

The Extended Phonic Code series introduces the various spellings for each sound. It can be used with any phonic programme a school is teaching.

The phonic progression in the series can be found on the back of this book.

Encourage the reader to say the sounds in the words and blend the sounds together, using pure sounds, without adding an extra 'uh' sound after the consonant sounds.

High-frequency words are words the reader may not be able to decode at this stage. In the process of learning the Extended Phonic Code, the reader will gradually be able to decode these words. Encourage the reader to sound out the sounds they know and provide the sounds not yet learned (pointing at letters that represent that sound). If the reader is struggling, offer the whole word.

Check that the reader understands all the words in the vocabulary on the page opposite.

Before reading this book, the reader needs to know:

- two or more letters can represent one sound
- the spelling <oo> can represent 'oo' as in 'boot' or as in 'look'

This book introduces:

- the spelling <oo> as in 'boot' and as in 'look'
- text at 2 syllable level

High-frequency words:

my, very, she, her, said, out, now, where, no, for, saw

Vocabulary:

- jiggle - to move up and down in jerky movements
wobbly - moves unsteadily from side to side
to swallow - to make something go down your throat

Introduction to the story:

Have you had a wobbly tooth yet?

Viv has a wobbly tooth.

Will the tooth fairy come to visit Viv?



Reading Practice

Practise blending these sounds into words:

The Tooth

Questions for discussion:

Reading game with the grapheme <oo>

Play as pelmanism or use for reading practice. Enlarge and photocopy the page twice on two different colours of card. Cut the cards up to play.

Ensure the players sound out the words.
